

Federal Matching Rates for Medicaid

Oklahoma

The federal government matches Oklahoma's contributions to Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). Oklahoma has a combination CHIP Program, which means that some CHIP-eligible children receive coverage through Medicaid, and others receive coverage through a separate CHIP Program. Any cut to the state Medicaid budget that impacts reimbursements for health care professionals who provide care for children enrolled in Medicaid could also reduce access to care for CHIP-eligible children enrolled in the program.

Medicaid

The federal contribution to a state's Medicaid program is determined by the state's Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (FMAP) rate. The FMAP is based on the state's per capita income compared to national per capita income.

Oklahoma's FMAP for Fiscal Year 2017 is 59.94 percent, which means that for every dollar the state spends on Medicaid, the federal government contributes \$1.50.

For every dollar the state of Oklahoma cuts from the Medicaid program, it will lose an additional \$1.50 in federal funding.

CHIP

The federal contribution to a state's CHIP program is determined by the state's Enhanced Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (E-FMAP) rate.

Oklahoma's E-FMAP for Fiscal Year 2017 is 94.96 percent, which means that in Oklahoma, \$.95 out of every dollar spent on CHIP comes from the federal government. The state contribution to CHIP is approximately \$.05 for every dollar spent on the program.
